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#### ABSTRACT

This summary gathers together for easy reference the inflected forms of Literary Sinhala together with a transliteration guide to the writing system. This work differs, therefore, from the authors' previous work, "Literary Sinhala" (1974), which presented the inflected forms in a pedagogical sequence. In this summary, the inflected forms are grouped into sections dealing with nouns, pronouns, quasi-verbs, and verbs. The guide to transliteration of the Sinhala writing system completes the volume. (CFM)

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#### PREFACE

summary gathers together for easy reference the inflected Sinhala together with forms οf Literary Virtually all of the transliteration quide to the writing system. forms given have been discussed in our <u>Literary Sinhala</u> (South Asia Program and Department of Modern Languages and Linguistics, Cornell, 1974), but they were presented there in a pedagogical sequence rather than in a form designed for reference, so that all of the forms of the verb, for example, did not appear in one place as they do here. A few forms and variants that did not occur in Literary Sinhala are given here, usually because they came to our attention after that work was completed.

In a few instances, the description of the way in which forms are made, as given here, differs somewhat from that in <u>Literary Sinhala</u>, even though the resulting forms are the same. This is usually a consequence of the different organization of the two works, but in a few cases reflects a subsequent reanalysis.

Only the formation and not the use of the forms is dealt with here, but extensive cross references are made to <u>Literary Sinhala</u> where their use is described.

A glance at the Table of Contents will make the organization of this work clear. Letter prefixes with mnemonic value -- N for Noun, V for Verb, etc. -- are used to designate main sections. This will allow the user to identify any section quickly, and also serves to distinguish cross-references within this work from those to <u>Literary Sinhala</u>, which do not bear letter prefixes.

Gregory Pearson carried out the task of preparing the English text for the computer and is largely responsible for the final format. Virtually all of the Sinhala typing was done by Heloise Perera. The cover graphic is by Helen Kelley.

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#### N. NOUN FORMS

Literary Sinhala nouns are divided into inanimate (classes and animate (class 5) on the basis of their inflection, specifically their singular endings. (These classes are retained from Colloquial Sinhalese\*, but in Literary Sinhala classes 1 and (L.S. 1, 3.2).are rare) This distinction agrees completely with the meaning of the nouns; that is, whether they refer to living, animate beings or not. Animate nouns in Literary be divided further into masculine and feminine. distinction is also on the basis of inflection and again parallels meaning. Feminine nouns are feminine in meaning, but masculine need not be masculine, but may also rerer to beings of unspecified gender.

Nouns inflect for  $\underline{\text{number}}$ ,  $\underline{\text{definiteness}}$  and  $\underline{\text{case}}$ . The endings are given in N.1 below.

In general, to derive the forms of a Sinhala noun, one needs to know the following:

- 1. the singular definite (nominative or direct)
- 2. the plural (nominative or direct)
- 3. the genitive singular definite (for inanimate nouns) since they are not predictable from one another. Given these forms, the remaining case, number and definiteness forms are usually predictable.

Both animate and inanimate nouns also have a <u>stem</u>, used largely in compounds. Although the stem, the definite singular and the plural are not as a whole predictable from one another, there are certain common patterns into which most nouns rit. They are given in N.2 below.

#### N.1 Case, Number and Definiteness Endings

#### N. 11 Inanimate Nouns (Classes 1-4)

Literary Sinhala inanimate nouns inflect for number - singular and plural; definiteness - definite and indefinite, and for four cases - direct, dative, genitive, and instrumental. The definiteness distinction applies only in the singular.

Class 1: Nouns on this class have a direct singular in -Om and are usually borrowings, particularly from English. They are very rare in Literary Sinhala, but if they do occur they have the same forms as in Colloquial. The paradigm of Od Om 'the bus' is given for reference. For details, see Colloquial Sinhalese, 1, 2 & 3 and II, Appendix; L.S. 1,3.2.

<sup>\*</sup>Noun and verb forms for Colloquial Sinhala have been summarized in the appendix of Volume II (pp. 186-195) of Gordon H. Fairbanks, James W. Gair, M. W. Sugathapala DeSilva <u>Colloquial Sinhalese</u>, South Asia Program, Cornell University, 1968. The following summary concentrates on those forms of Literary Sinhala that differ from Colloquial.

<u>Class 2</u>: Class 2 nouns are by far the most common in Literary Sinhala (1,3.22). The endings are the same as in Colloquial, except for the genitive which is -0 (i.e. always long) or its alternate -00. The definite singular endings are thus: direct -q; dative -q0; genitive -0 or -00; instrumental -00.

- oga is sometimes found as an alternate for - তা in the instrumental singular.

The genitive  $-\delta$  can be used wherever  $-\delta \hat{\omega}$  appears, but the latter occurs most often indicating location and more rarely in the other uses of  $\delta$ . It could thus be considered a separate, locative case. The inderinite ending  $-\delta \hat{\omega}$  is also found particularly in older writings (15,8).

Class 3: Class 3 nouns differ from Class 2 only in that the genitive singular has  $-\varphi$  (rather than  $-\vartheta$ ), and the instrumental is generally  $-\varphi\vartheta$  (rather than  $-\vartheta\vartheta$ ) (1,3.23). Thus, the endings of the definite singular are: direct  $-\varphi$ ; dative  $-\varphi\vartheta$ ; genitive  $-\varphi$ ; instrumental  $-\varphi\vartheta$ .

<sup>\*</sup>The direct singular of an inanimate noun of Class 2 ends in -q. This is counted as part of the endings here, since that makes its replacement by -0, -00 and -00 easier to show. Note that the nominative endings of animate nouns in N.12 are not so treated, since there are several of them, and the same replacements do not take place.

One sometimes meets the -00 ending of the Class 2 genitive on Class 3 nouns as well. Thus 2000.

Class 4: Class 4 nouns (those with a direct singular in -0 of -0) are very rare in Literary Sinhala, since most Colloquial Class 4 nouns would end in -qw in Literary (1,3.24). They are thus largely restricted to place nouns like 2006 which has only singular definite forms as follows:

#### N. 12 Animate Nouns (Class 5)

#### N.121 General Animate Case and Definite Endings

Animate nouns, like inanimates, inflect for number and definiteness. They inflect for five cases: nominative, accusative, dative, genitive and instrumental. Many animate nouns have a sixth case, the vocative. As with inanimate nouns, there are a number of kinds of relationships in shape between the singular, plural and stem form which will be dealt with in N.2.

The case and definiteness endings for masculine and reminine nouns are similar, differing primarily in the indefinite (1,3.3; 3,1; 7,1.1). They are as follows:

The vocative case, like the singular definite and plural nominative, varies with the noun, and will be dealt with in N.122 below.

Cases other than the nominative are sometimes called, collectively, oblique cases. Note that the indefinite and plural accusative forms can be looked on as oblique stems, from which the other oblique cases are formed by adding the same case endings as for the singular definite.

For some nouns, the accusative singular definite differs from the nominative (see N.122.5 below) but for most they are the same.

Nouns with a plural in -c; do not take the -d in the plural case endings, but use the same ones as the singular (see N.122,6 below).

Some animate nouns take an indefinite in casaa or add. Both of these are honorific, but add is restricted largely to clergy: dayadomacia and a Buddhist monk. casaa is used primarily with kin terms and with occupational titles borrowed from English: අපීමා යෙනෙක් 'a mother': ඩුයිචර් කෙනෙක් 'a driver'.

#### N.122 Vocative Case

Animate nouns have a vocative case, used in addressing the one or ones referred to (8,8). The most common forms of the vocative are as follows:

<sup>\*</sup>Since there are several nominative singular endings, they are not given as part of the case endings here (as the direct singular was for inanimate nouns in N.11). Note that the animate definite plural endings are added to the nominat ve singular ending, while the indefinite endings replace it.

<sup>\*\*</sup>The accessative is the same as the nominative definite for most, but not all, types of animate nouns.

<sup>\*\*\*</sup>As stated earlier, the plural is not predictable from the singular, nor the reverse, though there are common patterns given below in N.2.

# N. 122.1 Vocative Singular

There are two main types of vocative in the singular, and many nouns occur with both. Type 2 below occurs in Colloquial Sinhala as well and is the usual one there.

Note that the form Downed never occurs by itself, but always as an adjunct to some preceding form such as with always monk', cood and seed 'swami, lord', and that the preceding form is in the plural accusative (oblique). Note also that this form takes the add indefinite since it is highly respectful. In general, forms with -co plurals tend to take the add or casad indefinite, and the latter is used even where respect is not involved: add driver'; pl. addoc : indef. addocasad.

# N.2 The Formation of Singular, Plural and Stem Forms

Although the singular, plural and stem forms of nouns are not entirely predictable from one another, most nouns follow one of a set of common patterns in forming these forms, and can be grouped accordingly. Thus when one encounters one of the forms of a new noun, he can assume that it will fall into one of the groups below 6

and then make a reasonable guess as to what the other forms might be.

Strictly from the point of view of grammatical analysis, it is usually simpler to regard the stem as the base from which the others are made. However, the stem is the form least often encountered, since it is restricted largely to the first member of compounds (except for inanimate nouns, where it is usually the same as the plural). Also, dictionaries generally list nouns under the singular. Thus the patterns below are grouped according to the singular and plural forms rather than by the stem form. Although there are nouns, sometimes very common ones, that do not fall into one or the other of these groups, these patterns cover by far the largest number of nouns in Sinhala.

#### N.21 Inanimate Nouns

For inanimate nouns, the direct singular usually ends in  $-\varphi$  (often in  $-\omega$  or  $-\partial$ ). The plural most commonly loses the  $-\varphi$  sometimes along with other changes in form.

For inanimate nouns, the stem is usually the same as the plural, or the plural without  $-\partial \mathcal{C}$  for nouns having that ending. The most common patterns are given below.

#### N.22 Animate Nouns

For animate nouns, as for inanimates, there are a number of patterns in form between singular, plural, and stem. There are, however, some generalizations that cover the singular and plural forms of by far the majority of animate nouns:

- 1. For masculine nouns, the general nominative singular ending is  $-\alpha$ ; (often in  $-\alpha$ ) or  $-\delta$ ).
  - 2. For feminine nouns, the most common nominative singular

endings are -o (or its alternate -ou) or -a (often in -o).

3. For both masculine and reminine nouns, the most common plural endings are -@ (often in -coi or -coi) or -c. The -c may be accompanied by doubling of a preceding consonant. For -c, there is a (somewhat archaic) alternate -g, which does not cause doubling (see N.223.2).

For most types of animate nouns, the stem differs from both the singular and the plural, unlike for inanimate nouns. Where it

is virtually always the same as the plural.

The most common patterns of relationship between singular, plural and stem are given below. Those groups under N.221 are masculine and those under N.222 are feminine. N.223 deals with some plurals and honorifics that apply to both.

There are a number of individual nouns or very small groups of nouns which show patterns other than these given here, but these must be learned individually in any case as irregular forms. The patterns given below do account for by far the majority of animare nouns.

#### N. 221 Masculine Nouns

Nouns in N.221.1 through N.221.5 have plurals in -0. N.221.6 through N.221.7 have plurals in -0, and N.221.8 through N.221.11 have other types of plurals.

A number of nouns, particularly kin terms and titles, (including those titles borrowed from English and other foreign languages) have plurals in -c. The -c is added directly to the nominative singular, which is commonly the same as the stem.

If the nominative singular ends in -q, it is shortened to -q- (pronounced a) if the -q, would be pronounced -a in Colloquial Sinhala or in reading aboud, but not if the pronounciation is -aa. (The pronunciation -aa is confined almost entirely to words of two syllables with a short first syllable, i.e. one consonant preceded by a short vowel, such as que putaa and the honorific -q0, tumaa). Some authors do not follow this shortening rule, and continue to write -q, before -c, with all nouns. (Note the relevant examples below.)

#### V \_ VERB FORMS

Verbs are generally listed in dictionaries and glossaries under the present base (-200) form. This form is of very limited occurrence in Literary Sinhala, though it is widely used in Colloquial.

Only Literary Sinhala verb forms are dealt with here. Specifically Colloquial forms may be found in Colloquial Sinhalese, and there is a summary in the Appendix (vol. II, pp. 190-195) .

#### V.1 Verb Stems and Classes

Literary Sinhala verbs have three stems from which other forms are made:

the present tense stem the past tense stem (this has two forms: an ordinary and a short form)

the past participial stem

Verbs for which the latter two stems and the forms based on them can be predicted from the present tense stem are reqular. Verbs for which at least one form is not so predictable are irreqular.

The present tense stem is obtained by removing the -aD the present base form. For most verbs the resulting stem will have at least two syllables and end in one of the vowels - q, -Q, Such verbs are Class 1, 2, or 3 according to the final vowel of the present stem.

Class 1: Stem in අ: කප (නවා) Class 2: Stem in ඉ: අදි (නවා) තර (නවා) 'do', etc. cut', 'pull', සිට්(නවා) 'be.

Some verbs have a present stem of one syllable. Most such monosyllabic verbs are irregular, but there is a very small regular class ending in q or qu: m(mb) 'eat', cm(mb) 'rub', etc. These are described in V.23. Except for the latter, all regular verbs belong to one of the classes 1, 2, or 3 above. (The reverse is not true, however, since some irregular verbs also belong to these classes.)

#### V.3 <u>Irregular Verbs</u>

In general, the procedure followed here is to give only those forms which are irregular, though if a verb has regular and irregular alternate forms, that fact is noted. Where any of the verb stems (see V.1) and all the forms derived from it are irregular, only the stem and a few sample forms, as stated below, are given. Other forms are made in the usual way from the stem unless specifically noted. Before consulting individual entries, the following points of organization regarding specific stems should be noted:

<u>Present tense stem</u>: Almost all Sinhala verbs are regular in the present tense. Thus the present tense stem is given only if it is not the same as the base form with  $-\infty 0$ , removed. If any specific form is irregular (<u>i.e.</u> not derived from the present stem in the usual way) it will be given.

<u>Past tense stem</u>: Most irregular verbs are irregular in the past tense. For each such verb, the past tense stem is given, followed by the first person singular as a sample form. The emphatic form is also given, since it sometimes has variants not directly formed from the past stem. Other forms, unless specifically given, are made in the usual way from the stem.

<u>Past tense</u> <u>short form stem</u>: For regular verbs, the past tense short form stem forms the base for the past tense short form (V.221.3) and the potential participle (V.222.11). For irregular verbs, these forms often involve complications such that it is difficult to state a short form stem and simple rules. Thus these forms, if irregular, are given in their entirety.

#### W. THE SINHALA WRITING SYSTEM - A GUIDE TO TRANSLITERATION

intended following sections use are for in transliterating Sinhala script into the Roman alphabet. They not deal with pronunciation, for which the appropriate section of Fairbanks, Gair and De Silva, <u>Colloquial Sinhalese</u> may be consulted, specifically the section on the writing system and the Introduction. It should be mentioned, however, that aspirated consonants are generally not distinguished from their unaspirated counterparts in reading Sinhala aloud, although some people may attempt to do so, with varying consistency, in formal situations.  $(\underline{n})$  and  $(\underline{n})$  are never distinguished in pronunciation, are c(1) and c(1), but are pronounced as the first member of each pair. One peculiarity of reading pronunciation is that though & may represent either /a/ or /aa/ in Colloquial Sinhala (Colloquial Sinhalese 7,12.4), some people may render it as /aa/ reading Literary Sinhala aloud, even where it would represent Colloquial /a/. uncle (dative)' Thus මාමාට 'maternal Colloquial /maamaTə/, but may be read aloud as /maamaaTə/. The finder list has the basic symbols and some combined symbols arranged according to their general similarity of shape, without regard to alphabetical order or what they represent. It has been designed to help one identify an unfamiliar symbol that encounters in a text or to distinguish between symbols that resemble each other in shape.

Symbols are given here in their careful handwritten form, but listing symbols, the typed forms are given for comparison (except in those cases where the symbols are not found on the typewriter).

#### W. 1 General Principles

The Sinhala writing system is used primarily for writing Sinhala, the official language of Sri Lanka. It is also used in that country for writing Pali, the canonical language of Theravada Buddhism and sometimes Sanskrit. It is essentially an alphabet, like other systems derived from an ancient Indian system. aiffers from those based on the Roman alphabet in particulars, most noticeably the differential treatment given to consonants and vowels. There are three main types of symbols in the Sinhala writing system:

- 1. Basic Consonant Symbols
- 2. Basic Vowel Symbols
- 3. Modifications

Modifications are written above, below, or to the right or left of the basic symbols to which they pertain, so that a basic symbol is like a nucleus with the modifications as satellites. Consonants are almost always written with basic consonant symbols, though there are a few modifications that represent consonants. Vowels, however, with virtually no exception, are written with basic symbols only if they begin a word, otherwise with modifications applied to the symbol representing the consonant they follow. To illustrate, using Roman capitals as basic symbols and small letters as modifications, it is as if 'ego' were spelled EGo and 'solo' Solo. One other important feature is that there is one vowel, in this case a, that is automatically implied by any basic consonant symbol unless it is either removed by a special modification used for that purpose or displaced by a modification represented by another vowel. To continue our examples, using \* as the 'a'-removing modification,  $\underline{la}$  would be L but  $\underline{lc}$  would be Lo, while al would be AL\*. Similarly pat, pit and pet might be PT\*, and  $P_i$  T\* and  $P_e$  T\*, while <u>sofa</u> and <u>ida</u> would be  $S_0$ F and ID.

#### W.2 Basic Symbols

W.21 <u>Basic Consonant Symbols</u> form the skeleton of the writing system. A basic consonant symbol unless specially marked always transliterates to a consonant followed by the vowel <u>a</u>. Hence as is  $\underline{ka}$ ,  $\underline{w}$  is  $\underline{sa}$  etc. In some cases there are common alternates, and these are joined by commas.

# W.4 Alphabetical Crder

Vowels precede consonants. The vowels occur in the order given in W.22. The consonants occur in the order of W.21 (reading row after row taking the top row first and proceeding to the last). If follows the vowels; half-nasals follow ordinary nasal plus consonant\*, so that nd precedes Md; mb precedes Mb, etc. Hence:

## W.5 <u>Finder List</u>

The finder list which follows on pages 80 and 81 is ordered only by similarity of shape, without regard to what the symbols stand for. It includes basic symbols and others for which the meaning of the whole is not predictable from its parts.

Thus to find an unfamiliar symbol, scan the list for a group of symbols that resemble it generally in shape, and then a look for the desired symbol among them. If it is not there, it is probably a basic symbol or a regular combination of a basic symbol and a modification, so consult sections W.2 and W.3.

# W.6 Chart of Consonant-vowel Combinations

The way in which individual consonant symbols combine with vowel modifications is shown in the chart on page 82.
